Reading Bag:

- Blue Folder:
 - Choose to read one of the books in the blue folder together. These are books that we would normally be working through together during our small group reading lessons. Your child may need some guidance and support with some of the words in the book. Consider trying one of these activities:
 - O Complete the included graphic organizer. When writing, encourage your child to tap out the sounds in each word and talk about how to spell the words correctly. Talk about the events/ information shared in the book.
 - Use the Mapping Board (scroll below) to practice spelling tricky sight words.
 This will help your child commit the word to memory.
 - Complete the "silent e" packet to practice reading words that follow the "silent e" pattern.
- Extra books: Ask your child to read one of the 10 books he/she chose as extra reading material. Consider trying one of these activities:
 - o Call or Face-time a friend or relative and have your child read over the phone.
 - Read outside under a tree!!
 - o Talk about the events of the story and practice retelling with details.
 - o If it is a non-fiction story, ask your child to talk about what he/she learned.

Sight Words:

- Continue to review sight words on a regular basis. The sight word flashcards are available on the resource page. Consider trying one of these activities:
 - Use the mapping board to practice tapping out sounds and spelling each word (scroll below to find the mapping board).
 - Line the words up on the sidewalk and hop to each word. Read and spell each word out loud.
 - Write the words with sidewalk chalk.
 - Tape the words all over the house and go on a hunt to see how many words you find.

• Hide the words around the house. Turn off all of the lights and use a flashlight to find the words.

Phonics Practice Card:

 Each day during reading lessons, we review the phonics sounds using the phonics practice cards. You can print the charts that are included below so that your child can continue to practice phonics sounds.

Heggerty Phonemic Awareness

• Each day during reading lessons, we also spend time practicing phonemic awareness. This is an important skill for students to practice when developing as readers. I have included information below about the Heggerty Phonemic Awareness curriculum. You can access video lesson samples and materials so that you can try this at home.

Handwriting:

- Use the included handwriting practice page to continue to work on handwriting skills. If you have it available, place it in a plastic sleeve and use a dry erase marker so that it can be practiced again and again. Consider also trying one of these activities:
 - Ask your child to lay on the floor and lean on their elbows when writing. This
 promotes muscle strength.
 - o Paint letters with water on the sidewalk
 - O Practice writing letters in the air or on a table-top with a finger. Practice proper letter formation. "We always start our letters at the top! " This promotes muscle memory.





Talking Letters Consonants
















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


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Tolking Letters Vowels by Syllable Type
