Alphabet Chart:

 Practice letter names and sounds using the alphabet chart or flashcards you have available at home.

CVC Word Reading:

- Practice reading CVC words in one of the following ways:
 - o Use magnetic letters to build CVC words in the 3 square strip (scroll below).
 - Use paper and pencil to write a list of CVC words
 - *When reading the words, practice blending the sounds slowly and then saying them fast to identify the word.
- Word families: Word families are words that all have the same ending chunk (rhyming words). Try one of the activities below to practice rhyming words:
 - Use magnetic letters on the word family house (scroll below) to practice building various words. Use the list of word families as a resource.
 - Make a list of word family words. Notice how they all of the same ending chunk.
 Practice reading each word.
- **Short Sound Ladder Game:** Scroll below to find a game that you can play to practice writing and reading CVC sight words.

Sight Words:

- Continue to review sight words on a regular basis. The sight word flashcards are available on the resource page. Consider trying one of these activities to practice sight words:
 - Use the included mapping board to practice tapping out sounds and spelling each word.
 - Line the words up on the sidewalk and hop to each word. Read and spell each word out loud.
 - Write the words with sidewalk chalk.
 - Tape the words all over the house and go on a hunt to see how many words you find.

• Hide the words around the house. Turn off all of the lights and use a flashlight to find the words.

Heggerty Phonemic Awareness

• Each day during reading lessons, we spend time practicing phonemic awareness. This is an important skill for students to practice when developing as readers. I have included information below about the Heggerty Phonemic Awareness curriculum. You can access video lesson samples and materials so that you can try this at home.


Handwriting:

- Use the enclosed handwriting practice page to continue to work on handwriting skills. If you have it available, place it in a plastic sleeve and use a dry erase marker so that it can be practiced again and again. Consider also trying one of these activities:
 - Ask your child to lay on the floor and lean on their elbows when writing. This promotes muscle strength.
 - Paint letters with water on the sidewalk
 - o Practice writing letters in the air or on a table-top with a finger. Practice proper letter formation. "We always start our letters at the top! "This promotes muscle memory.

Short Sounds Ladder Game (Game board below)

Directions:

- 1. Use coins or any small object at home as game pieces.
- 2. Roll a die and move the game piece accordingly to the picture.
- 3. Ask your child to say the word and then stretch out the sounds in the word.
 - a. Example: "pig" = /p/ /i/ /g/.
 - b.Build the word with magnetic letters or write out the word. Read the word together.
 - c. Discuss: What is the beginning sound? What is the ending sound? What is the vowel sound?




Orthographic Mapping with Sight Words


- 2. Finger spell to count the phonemes.
