Course: Vietnam War Survey Grade Level: 10th, 11th, 12th

Development/Revision Date: February 2024 Length of Time: 90 Days

Course Description:

This course provides an overview of the Vietnam War beginning with the relevant history of Southeast Asia, followed by the impact of European imperialism and colonialization on the region. The primary focus of the course will be American intervention prior to, during, and following armed conflict in Southeast Asia. In addition to the global and national impacts of the Vietnam War, this course will include viewing the war through the lens of those who experienced it, both in country and at home. The course examines the social, economic, ideological, diplomatic, and military aspects of the Vietnam War.

Course Objectives:

- Examine the history of animosity and conflict within Southeast Asia
- Understand the impact of French occupation and colonialism on Southeast Asia
- Analyze American intervention in Vietnam prior to armed conflict
- Investigate major military engagements and operations to include the personal impact on individuals
- Assess the anti-war movement and the coordinated effort to mislead the American people
- Analyze how the Vietnam War impacted America following the withdraw of all combat forces

- Examine the firsthand experiences of those involved in the Vietnam War both in country and at home
- Evaluate the consequences of the Vietnam War for American citizens and America's global influence and status
