Use capital letters, periods, and your best spelling.	Word Sort Cut out your new word sort. Do the sort and read the words to a grown-up.	Non-Fiction Read a non-fiction story. List 2- 3 facts you learned from the story.
Math Facts Using dice, a deck of cards or your own cards with numbers 1- 9. Roll or choose 2 numbers. Write them into an adding or subtracting sentence and solve. Use your strategies. How fast can you solve the problem.	Informational Writing Draw a picture or make a sculpture of an animal. Write 5 sentences about your animal. Use capital letters, periods, and your best spelling for each fact.	Rainbow Write Rainbow write six of your sight words or pattern words.	Questioning Listen to someone read a book/story to you. Ask a question about the book before, during, and after reading. Can you answer the questions using what you know?
Measurement—non standard units Choose items from your house. Measure to see how long they are. Use pennies, paper clips, cereal, etc. to measure.	Writing Conventions Choose at least 3 friends to write 3 separate sentences about, telling why you like them. Check to be sure you used correct capital letters, punctuation, and spelling.	Writing Sentences Read your sight word list and choose three words to write in three separate sentences. The topic of each sentence is up to you. Challenge: Can you put all three words into one sentence that makes sense.	Retelling Read a book/story to a family member or stuffed animal. Practice your retelling skills. Include the beginning, middle, and end (in order). Don't forget to include many important text details.
Math Measurement- comparison Choose 3 objects from your house of different sizes. Order them in size order. Tell a grown-up about them using the words longer, longest, shorter, shortest	Writing Letter Writing Write a letter to your teacher . Tell her about a favorite story/book you read. Tell her 3 reasons why you liked the story.	Word Work Sight Words Choose 6 or more sight words to write. Talk about the word. How many letters are in the word? Can you use the word in a sentence?	Reading Read Read a book/story. Talk about your favorite part. Can you identify the characters, setting, problem, and/or solution.



Dillsburg Elementary First Grade Sample Daily Schedule Remote Learning

Students are used to routine and structure during the school day. If you need some suggestions for maintaining structure for your child, the following ideas may be helpful.

Wake Up: Make your bed!

Breakfast: Enjoy a healthy breakfast.

Brush your teeth: Be sure to brush for two minutes!

Exercise: Do ten jumping jacks or visit <u>www.gonoodle.com</u> for some fitness fun.

Puzzle Time: Do a word search, sudoku, crossword, or dot-to-dot.

Pattern Word Practice: Use words from your take-home-bag and practice patterns.

Schoolwork (reading/writing): Read a story, complete one Reading block, one Word Work block, and one Writing block from the grid you received in your take-home-bag.

Playtime: Go outside if possible. Breathe in that beautiful fresh air! How fast can you run?

Lunch: Enjoy a healthy lunch.

Reading Rainbow: watch a Reading Rainbow video at Discovery Education (link from district Class Link). If you don't have internet, read a favorite book!

Schoolwork (math): Complete one Math block from the grid you received in your take-home-bag. Tallying practice: Tally how many glasses of water you drink today.

Quiet Imagination Time: Spend some time coloring or drawing, playing with play doh, doing a craft, or building with legos while listening to calming music.

Clean Up and Chores: Just like at school, it's important to tidy up throughout the day. Ask your parents how you may be able to help around the house!

Playtime: Go outside if possible. Breathe in that beautiful fresh air! Bounce a ball if you have one.

Dinner: Enjoy a healthy dinner.

Magic School Bus: watch a Magic School Bus video at Discovery Education (link from district Class Link). If you don't have internet read a book.

Brush your teeth: be sure to brush for two minutes!

Bedtime Story: Read a story with a grownup.

Sweet Dreams: Get a good night's sleep.
